

## Pastor Paul's Monthly Message for April

Dear Members and Friends,

In my Christian Living class, we just finished reading the classic short story, "The Lady, or the Tiger?" by Frank Stockton. Many of you are probably familiar with the story. An ancient king had a unique way of determining innocence or guilt. A subject accused of a crime would be brought into a large arena. The crowd would gather and the subject had to make a choice between two identical doors. Behind one, was a tiger ready to devour him. Behind the other, was a beautiful maiden who would be given to him in marriage.

The story gets more intense, as the king discovers that his daughter is in love with a non-royal. The young man is immediately arrested and a date is set for his trial in the king's arena. He will have to choose between the two doors, one will bring certain death, the other will bring a beautiful young maiden to be his wife. In either case, the princess and her lover would not be together.

The princess is able to find out what lies behind each door. She knows what door will bring forth the tiger and what door will bring forth the beautiful maiden. The young man enters the arena and looks up at the princess for a sign. She gives a slight motion to the right. Without the slightest hesitation, he went to the door on the right, and opened it. Did the lady come out of that door, or the tiger?

In a brilliant way, the author leaves the ending up to the reader. Is it the lady, or the tiger? I posed this question to my 8<sup>th</sup> graders. The result: Tiger = 16, Lady = 2. I asked why, and the first response was, "If she couldn't have him, nobody would!"

"The Lady, or the Tiger?" was written in 1882, but sadly in 2017 negatives such as jealousy, possessiveness and power still damage relationships. Women are in need of orders of protection and support, because their partner proclaims, "If I can't have her, nobody will." Our Healing Center exists to assist women who are in danger of abuse or experiencing abuse from a partner or ex-partner.

On April 22<sup>nd</sup>, over 500 young people will gather for our Healing Center's 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Teen Dating Violence Awareness Walkathon. The young people of our community need to know what constitutes a positive loving relationship and what does not. Jealousy, possessiveness, power & control lead to all types of abuse. A positive relationship involves an equal partnership in which there is love and respect in all areas of a couple's interaction. Our young people need to know the difference between a good relationship and a bad one.

The Healing Center is committed to the prevention and intervention of intimate partner and family violence, abuse and sexual assault, serving people of diverse faiths, cultures and personal experience. Bethlehem Lutheran Church embraces this incredible ministry!

## Dear Members.

Take Action! Improve your life! Master your future!

The Boomers are coming! The Boomers are coming! Oops! They're here already.

Boomers refer to the group of people who were born during the Post World War II Baby Boom from 1946 until 1960. The nation's 76 million baby boomers (who are now between 57 and 71 years of age) have been given an unprecedented gift of health and time. I am one of them. Being a few years away from retirement, I realized that I was not at all prepared to make the move to the next phase of life. I certainly didn't feel that I know how to make the most of it.

I found I was not alone. With traditional retirement plans disappearing, the cost of daily living continuing to rise, and more than 84% of people over 65 coping with at least one chronic health condition, how do you make the most of this new stage of life – your "leisure years?" It is a fun, innovative, education program that teaches participants to embrace their gift of longevity by spending more time each day doing things that are good for themselves and for others. Dear Friends.

Happy spring,

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month and Sexual Abuse Awareness Month. I want to share with you key information about child sexual abuse from the National Sexual Violence Resource Center and the Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network. Child sexual abuse or child molestation is a form of child abuse in which an adult or older adolescent uses a child for sexual stimulation. Child sexual abuse includes rape, commercial sexual exploitation of children, exposure, fondling, voyeurism, sexual assault, and exposure. Child sexual abuse is considered a type of child maltreatment, which also includes physical and psychological abuse as well as forms of neglect. (NSVRC). Child sexual abuse is difficult to talk about or acknowledge. Yet it happens every day, child sexual abuse affects thousands of young children and teens. One in nine girls and one in 53 boys under the age of 18 experience sexual abuse or assault at the hands of an adult, 82% of all victims under 18 are female, of all victims' under 18, two out of three are ages 12-17. Child victims often know who their perpetrator is. Among cases of child sexual abuse reported to Law Enforcement 93% are known to the victim, 7% are strangers, 59% are acquaintances and 34% are family members. (RAINN).

Grooming tactics are used to recruit children to establish a trusting relationship, by connecting with the child, sexual predators give them gifts, take them out, make them feel that they are important, giving children attention and affection they may be lacking. Many perpetrators will also use imitation tactics, threats for a child to stay quiet or threatening to harm the child or a member in the family. The people who committed these crimes are trusted by the children they harm and at times are respected people in the community.

Child sexual abuse is a crime, a sin and it's underreported. What can you do to raise awareness? Talk to children about body safety, teach children the difference between okay and not okay touches, between good and bad secrets, empower them to say no when they don't want to be touched. We can each do our part by believing and supporting the children in our lives; by reporting any and all suspected child sexual abuse to child protective services or to law enforcement.

Join us on Saturday, April 22, 2017 for the NYC Teen dating Violence Awareness Walkathon; hundreds of teens, children, schools community people will walk to say "NO' to dating violence. If you are interested in volunteering please contact the office 718-238-5138.

# SENATOR GOLDEN TO HONOR THE HEALING CENTER AS PART OF WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH CELEBRATION

Urges Community To Write About A Special Woman In Their Life

Brooklyn - State Senator Martin J. Golden (R-C-I, Brooklyn) today announced that, as part of Women's History Month, he will be hosting a special event recognizing Antonia Clemente and the organization she runs, he Healing Center (THC), for their work which has impacted the lives of so many in the community.

Antonia Clemente is the Executive Director and co-founder of The Healing Center. THC helps families affected by violence understand their options and how to take steps toward healing and self-sufficiency. Reaching out to different cultural and socio-economic backgrounds, THC works to prevent family violence in our community. The Center's educational workshops, which are offered at local schools and churches, raise community awareness concerning family violence, elder abuse, and sexual assault. Empowerment support groups provide sessions to encourage self-esteem, offer alternatives and help clients understand the dynamics of violence and the cycle of abuse in their lives. THC also provides safe space for children who witness domestic violence, and offers a special program for teenage girls who witness and are victimized by violence in the home or through teen dating violence.

In order to provide assistance to THC, Senator Golden is asking the community to donate gift cards that will be presented to Ms. Clemente during a reception that will be held on April 28th from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., at the Norwegian Christian Home, located at 1250 67th St, Brooklyn, NY 11219. Gift cards for supermarkets and chain store pharmacies can be delivered to the Senator's District Office, 7408 Fifth Avenue by Thursday April 27th. Please note the amount of your contribution directly on the gift card.

Senator Golden described Ms. Clemente as "a special woman, who has made a real contribution to countless people and families in the community. For nearly two decades, the Center has been a major resource for many of the most vulnerable in our neighborhoods."

The Healing Center began operations out of a church kitchen in 2000. In 2004, the Healing Center formed a board of directors and in November of 2005, became a 501(c)(3), not-for-profit organization. In 2008 the Healing Center was invited to partner with Bethlehem Lutheran Church in sharing the good news of hope, peace and healing to victims and survivors of family violence. As THC has expanded its mission, it has developed collaborations with the Brooklyn District Attorney's Office, CONNECT, Sanctuary for Families, Safe Horizons, and the Metropolitan New York Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

Noting that "we all have a special woman in our life who has influenced our lives, be it a role model or mentor, a family member, someone from our community or famous person," Senator Golden is asking members of the community to write brief paragraphs about these special women and what role they play in your life. The paragraph should start with... "This special woman influenced my life because..."

These letters will be on display during the reception and will also be rotated and displayed in the windows of Senator Golden's District Office. Letters should be sent to: Senator Marty Golden, 7408 Fifth Avenue, Brooklyn, NY 11209 and must be received by Thursday April 27th.

## Help Me, Lord! My Child May Be Suicidal

"I lift my eyes to the mountains—where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of

The Lenten season is meant to be a time of contemplation—a time to reflect our relationship with Jesus, our Lord. We study the significant points of Jesus' life— his baptism, wilderness experience and his own feelings of desolation and desertion by his disciples as he journeys toward the cross and his triumphant resurrection.

People of all ages can have feelings of desperation. We may feel abandoned and forgotten, misunderstood and desolate. We yearn for peace and understanding, even when it seems like an impossible dream.

According to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (afsp.org), more than twice as many people in New York State die from suicide than by homicide. Suicidal ideation can be a brief, passing thought or a prelude to self-inflicted violence and death. How do we know if someone we care about is serious about ending their own life? Every statement made about suicidal ideation needs to be assessed by a medical or a mental health professional. Lutheran Counseling Center psychotherapists are well qualified to make this assessment.

The Jason Foundation (jasonfoundation.com) was created after one family's tragic loss, to assist parents to learn how to prevent suicide in their own family. The authors state that suicide is a "silent epidemic" among young people. Nationally, suicide claims more than 100 young lives per week. Parents must be alert and pay attention to changes in behaviors and attitudes. Girls make more attempts but boys are more likely to die because they choose more violent means of death. LGBTQ youths are at higher risk because of harassment in school and society. When people are suffering, their life stressors often exceed their ability to cope with stress in a healthy way.

The primary warning signs for suicide are a change in behavior or attitudes particularly after a traumatic life event. Many feel like a burden to others or state they have no reason to live. Specific behaviors that indicate an increased risk of suicide completion include increased use of alcohol to cope with everyday life, acting recklessly, isolation from others, sleep disturbances, certain types of mood disorders or giving favorite items away.

If you have a concern about anyone you know, taking direct action might save a person's life. There are many resources and details listed in the previously cited websites. We Christians need to be reminded that help is available for us to know what to do next. The psalmist reminds us that our help is in the Lord our Maker who also creates professionals who care.
